The President's Report From The Vice President Jean Swain

I cannot believe how quickly time flies by in this beautiful community. I am so happy to be back in Lazy River. We have had a very interesting and productive past two years and the majority of that progress has to be assigned to two wonderful people, Charles Sulzbach and Rusty Shelley.

When we took office in January 2020 who knew what lay before us. Who knew that Covid-19 would put us upside down and sideways and never seem to let up? Who knew we would inherit a maintenance building in such an uncompleted state or financial books that needed a lot of work? Who knew directors would resign? Who knew we would have to search and search for a manager who really knew his stuff?

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Manager's Report

The drainage work will be a major focus during January. We will be jetting out several of the drain lines, adding a few additional catch basins, repairing some road grate/



catch basins and checking the operational status of the assist pumps in the various locations.

Christmas lights throughout the park should be down by the 8th of January so the lawn cutting crews have no issues.

The FY2022 Budget passed by the BOD resulted in a \$4.00 increase or \$168 per month

The beautification folks have been busy with painting, pressure washing and reviewing some other projects.

The palm tree trimming was delayed due to labor and scheduling by our landscape company and we received a \$4900 credit in December. They have us scheduled for the end of January.

There are three open positions for the Board of Directors to be voted for at the annual members meeting on **Thursday**, **February 11th**.

part time bookkeeper and then found a temporary
Manager who in turn found us a wonderful part time

Manager who in turn found us a wonderful part time manager who really knows his stuff.

With the resignation of the directors, we appointed two full time residents – Ted Makowski and Keith Rule – and Rich Tindell as the replacement directors. They embraced the job fully and completely and were such a blessing and contributed so much to keeping our community going through such a difficult time.

When it became apparent that Covid was not letting up or letting me back into my other home. Charles Sulzbach came to the rescue and was appointed by the Board as President of the Village. Charles took on the task with his calm steady way and made sure the maintenance building was done and done right. He also took on the assignment (after years and years of many trying but failing to solve the issue) of solving the many drainage problems that have plaqued Lazy River for at least the 17 years I have been here and probably longer. Engineers were hired and with Charles Sulzbach's and Tom VanMassenhove's and our Manager, Rick Siliker's, oversight we are starting to implement and see true improvements in our drainage issues. For the first time we have a plan with solutions we can implement in stages.

Charles also noted the seriousness of the erosion at the marina and its threat to undermine the road to Island Point and the importance of stopping the problem before it became too big to solve.

We heard loud and clear the concerns of residents that come summer time the standards drop and our community does not have the same beautiful look as when the snowbirds arrive. This problem has also been an issue since the beginning of Lazy River Village and it can be attributed to basically two issues – some caretakers only really do their job just before the homeowner returns and the second is that our Rules and Regulations currently use a "fining" technique that can take three months to solve the violation. A new Rules and Regulations Committee is working on a faster solution to violations, by creating a fee for service, to charge violators of the rules. This technique will also allow the Manager to finally have the tools needed to address violations quickly. By installing Tow Away signs in the storage yard the Manager will also be able to address violators of lease agreements.

We have four new wonderful directors in Tom VanMassenhove, Linda Deisler, Theresa Jones and Rich Donelson. Each one of these directors has a skill set that compliments the other directors and I have faith in this community to continue to improve and remain the friendly wonderful place we call home.

The Law of Antagonium.

Life without war is impossible either in nature or in grace. The basis of physical, mental, moral, and spiritual life is antagonism or oppositon.

Whenever we fail to work or fight against whatever is in opposition in the above areas of life, we begin the process of dying. According to Genesis 2:16, 17, along with Roman 3:23 we are all dealing with death. In Revelation 2:7 the Holy Spirit speaks to the church

that they have lost their first love: Love God with all of your heart, and with all thy soul, and with all of thy mind. This is the first and great commandment (Deut. 6:4, 5), and the second is like it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. (Matt 22:36-40)

So the fight to overcome is either all our love is for God (above all other loves), or our love of "self", above God. Consider the following:

HEALTH: health is the balance between physical life and external nature, and it is maintained only by sufficient vitality on the inside against things on the outside. Everything outside my physical life is designed to put me to death. Things which keep me going when I am alive, disintegrate me when I am dead. If I have enough fighting power I produce the balance of heath.

MENTAL: mental life is the same. If I want to maintain a vigorous mental life, I have to fight and in that way the mental balance called thought is produced.

MORAL: Morally it is the same. Everything that does not partake of the nature of virtue is the enemy of virtue in me, and it depends on what moral calibre I have whether I overcome and produce virtue. Immediately I fight I am moral in that particular. No man is virtuous because he cannot help it; virtue is acquired.

SPIRITUAL: And spiritually it is the same. Jesus said, "In the world ye shall have tribulation." Everything that is not spiritual makes for my undoing, but – "Be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." I have to learn to cross off the things that come against me, and in that way produce the balance of holiness: then it becomes a delight to meet opposition.

HOLINESS IS THE BALANCE BETWEEN MY DISPOSITION AND THE LAW OF GOD AS EXPRESSED IN JESUS CHRIST.

I am continuing the study in the Old Testament to help prepare us to better understand the New Testament in the Thursday Bible Study beginning at 10 am in the clubhouse cardroom. All are welcome.

Golf Couples League

Although some of our members will return home for the Christmas holidays, we expect to have approximately 36 golfers on Sundays throughout December, with an increase expected in



January when people return to Lazy River Village. The three courses at Waterford Golf have been in good condition and its dining room has received great reviews for the food served after we finish golfing.

Our green fee, through to the end of April, for 9 holes with a cart is \$30.00 plus tax. A small bucket of range balls is included with our green fee, if anyone wants to use the driving range before golfing.

The format is a scramble, i.e., each person takes their own shot but the foursome plays from the best shot. A drive from each member of the foursome must be used at least once during the game.

Our tee times on each of the three courses will be between approximately 1:00 p.m. and 1:40 p.m., depending on the number of our members golfing that day. Most of us enjoy a libation in the clubhouse after golf and, if there are approximately twenty diners, the kitchen will stay open until 4:00 p.m. to serve us.

INTERNET-TV COMMITTEE UPDATE

In October 2022 our current contract with Frontier will expire. By mid-April 2022 Lazy River will need to decide whether to renew with Frontier or go with another provider. If a new provider is selected, it could take up to six months for complete installation. The TV-Internet Committee invites all residents to familiarize themselves with features and services being offered, their costs, and how these costs can save dollars being spent on services presently subscribed to, both here in Lazy River and in our northern homes.

We've already had our first workshop, on December 2, during which Hotwire presented what they have to offer. Attend one of the two remaining workshops, or better, both. These are tentatively scheduled to follow Koffee Klatch on each of the last two Wednesdays in January. This will be your opportunity to learn what is being offered, how it impacts you, and to ask any



questions you may have. Attendance at one or more of these workshops is *highly recommended*. We are also planning additional information sessions, to be announced.

Our current bulk service agreement cost to the community is \$26.49 per shareholder and is assessed for all 356 homes in the community, covering TV only. This is part of everyone's Home Owners' Association (HOA) fee. Current separate subscriber selected costs include:

- Basic Internet at \$45/month for 50/50 Mbps service
- HD digital set top boxes, at a cost of \$11/month each
- DVR's at a cost of \$15/month
- Premium TV channels and suites (costs vary)

At the workshops the following options will be discussed:

Option 1 – This option would be continuing our service with Frontier. Nothing is supposed to change as far as features, although it must be noted that some channels have been removed, and there's no guarantee that others won't be added or removed. *The total monthly cost* for continuing this service would be \$84, part of which includes a 4.8% bulk rate increase starting in October 2022. Certain additional services subscribed to (Internet, multiple HD set top boxes, etc.) can be put on seasonal hold, at the current one-time each cost of \$39.99.

Bottom line impact: HOA fees could be increased about \$2 per month and all additional service and feature costs as noted above will continue to apply.

Option 2 – This option applies to multiple service providers offering *included Internet* with significantly higher speeds than we're currently getting. The channel line-ups will be similar or identical to what we currently receive. The monthly costs for these providers range from roughly \$78 to \$84, and whichever of these amounts applies will be a bulk rate cost, meaning that *these services cannot be put on seasonal hold*.

Bottom line impact: HOA fees could be increased between \$52 to \$58 per month over Option 1, but those subscribing to Internet would **save \$45 per month or more**, for a total projected increase between \$7 to \$13 per month. Anyone who has additional HD set top boxes would also **save an additional \$11 per month** per HD set top box.

Option 3 – This option is similar to Option 2, except that the channel line-up may offer: 1) less in the total number of TV channels; and 2) a change of local stations. This change of local stations means that we would no longer receive the Tampa stations as our local channels. These would be switched to Ft. Myers plus Sarasota 7, the ABC affiliate recently dropped by Frontier. This provider would be installing between two and three large satellite dishes. High speed Internet service is included. Like Option 2 this monthly cost *cannot be put on seasonal hold*, but does *save every Internet subscriber at least \$45 per month*. This is the least expensive in terms of *total dollars* for Internet subscribing residents.

Bottom line impact: HOA fees could be increased between \$24 to \$35 per month compared to Option 1 but there would be no additional cost for Internet service, resulting in at least a *total net monthly savings* -- what's included in the HOA fee plus Internet -- of approximately \$14 over Option 1 *for Internet subscribers*. Extra set top boxes run between \$7-\$15 monthly depending on type.

Bulk service unit cost has yet to be nailed down, but should not exceed \$61 including taxes. It could be slightly less. What the table doesn't clearly show is that the least expensive total option, Dish Fiber, could represent a projected \$22 increase over Frontier's Version 1 proposal.

Terms you may hear at the workshops:

Basic internet service – the least internet speed which is generally provided to all residents with the option to purchase additional speed.

Infrastructure – We are currently set up with a fiber optic infrastructure from Frontier. Satellite requires bulky dishes and substations and has been subject to receptions variations due to weather. Dish Fiber claims this is less of an issue than it had been.

Bulk Service – Savings from purchasing services and features as a community rather than individually. This represents potentially vast savings over ala carte selections.

Door Fee – may be a fixed or variable amount that the company will give back as an incentive to use their services.

Another important point to consider: the service we decide on is an amenity that could have an impact on our home values.


FEBRUARY - PIZZA NIGHT and the MARCH - BARBECUE will also be held outside. Details to follow.

The Current Sky

The Current Sky with the Telescope Guy – January 2022

At the time of this writing, we are unsure how bright Comet Leonard will become, but to be sure, we will never see it again. For those watching the planets, Venus will be lost into the Sun's glare as an evening view, finally dipping below the horizon after Friday, January 7th at dusk. If you have a good view of the horizon, you can see it's progression the first week of January.


The figure* below shows the planets Jupiter, Saturn, and Mercury during the first few weeks of the month. The tiny crescent of the just born, waxing moon joins the Planet trio January 3-5th shortly after sunset, with January 3rd being the hardest to see the moon's silver, just below the planet Mercury. These views are close to the horizon, so a small set of binoculars will certainly aid you.

Later, a good evening view of the planet Mercury will occur between January 10th – January 14th, with a necklace of Jupiter, Saturn, and Mercury, still close to the horizon. This will be the timeline when Saturn and Mercury's apparent "closeness" will be clear to the observer. Given it's name, Mercury is fleet of foot so catch it while you can!
